

## **Financial Counselor Resource and Referral Guide**

This Resource and Referral Guide was developed to assist Financial Counselors who are providing services to individuals with disabilities, including those receiving Social Security Disability benefits such as Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) through the Social Security Administration (SSA).

When serving SSA beneficiaries, there can be an added level of complexity because the disability service system can be confusing, both to beneficiaries and the professionals assisting them. The goal of this guide is to help you identify resources and organizations that can help clients manage situations that go beyond what can be addressed through financial counseling.

## Content

This guide is broken down into two sections:

**I. Disability Specific Federal Resources:** The first section lists the area of need a person may benefit from, as well as the services provided, contact information and hints on when to use the resource/s.

**II. Specific Disability Supports:** The second section provides resources and contact information for a variety of specific disability resources.

SSA Protection and Advocacy	Serves Social Security Disability Insurance and Supplemental Security Income beneficiaries with disabilities who feel that SSA has discriminated against them.	Protection and Advocacy for Beneficiaries of Social Security (PABSS) National Nonprofit	The PABSS Program provides legal support, advocacy and information to help you resolve disability employment-related concerns. PABSS can help at no cost if a person receives SSI or SSDI.
